ARRL Volunteers Nixes Ban on Mobile Ham Use

What if you were permanently banned by state law from operating your mobile ham radio station under the so-called "Minnesota Hands-Free" bill? Well it almost happened right here, under our noses. While the bill's intent was to legislate safe cell phone operation while driving, as originally written, the consequences would be to prohibit use of amateur radio mobile operations as well.

Originally written and approved by both houses of the Minnesota Legislature with no exception for amateur radio, in the final hours of conference committee in March of 2019, the case was made for amending the language to specifically exclude any restrictions on amateur radio operation. The language was changed because ARRL volunteers in Minnesota followed this bill carefully and maintained close communication with lawmakers to defend the rights of amateur radio operators in Minnesota. While this was a decided victory for us at the state level, we need a watchful eye on our behalf in Washington, DC as well.

ARRL's Washington team is also vigorously working at the federal level with congress members in order to identify legislation that could impact amateur radio licensees and operators in all U.S. states and territories. They provide much-needed expert analysis and background information to legislators to help them understand the full scope and importance of amateur radio operation as it pertains to any given bill.

It is essential that we understand how important the work of ARRL is as a powerful force dedicated to protecting and defending our rights as amateur radio operators. The **ARRL** describes their **Legislative Objectives**:



To advance the art, science, and enjoyment of Amateur Radio

"The ability of the Amateur Radio Service to maintain and expand its benefits to the public rests on two key elements of public policy: adequate access to the radio spectrum and the ability to install and operate effective Amateur Radio stations.

You must be interested in joining a group of individuals that are dedicated to amateur radio, emergency communications, and willingness to learn and used military communications procedures for voice and digital communications.

You must have equipment that will meet the minimum requirements for voice and digital operation. The equipment will be: transmitter, receiver, (transceiver) modified to operate out of amateur radio bands, computer, modem, and antenna's that are designed to operate on military assigned frequencies. (The best antenna's will be a dipole cut to the operational frequency. NVIS antennas work best. You will not need a linear amplifier, however if you have one that will operate on out of amateur radio bands that will be a plus)

You must go through and complete training. You are allowed up to 180 days to do so.

Air Force MARS operation's and procedures are based upon "MARS Operating Instruction", (MOI). The MOI manual uses as its basis for instruction a series of Allied Communications Publications (ACP's), Department of Defense Directives, Department of Defense Instructions, and Department of Defense Manual.



"To implement these two key elements of public policy... the following legislative objectives were developed and approved by the ARRL Board to guide the efforts of ARRL volunteers and staff [in the past few years]:

- Objective #1: The ARRL Seeks legislation instructing the FCC to extend the requirement for "reasonable accommodation" of Amateur Radio station antennas (a requirement that now applies to state and local regulations) to all forms of land use regulation.
- Objective #2: The ARRL opposes legislation that would leave to the reallocation of amateur spectrum or to sharing arrangements that reduce the utility of existing allocations.
- Objective #3: The ARRL opposes legislation that diminishes the rights of federal licensees in favor of unlicensed emitters or encourages the deployment of spectrum-polluting technologies.
- Objective #4: The ARRL seeks recognition of the unique resources, capabilities, and expertise of the Amateur Radio Service in any legislation addressing communications issues related to emergencies, disasters or homeland security.
- Objective #5: The ARRL supports complementary legislative objectives of other radio communication services, particularly the public safety and scientific services that require spectrum access and protection from interference for noncommercial purposes that benefit the public.
- Objective #6: The ARRL opposes "distracted driving" legislation that does not clearly define the class of devices included in the regulation so as to exclude two-way mobile radio transmitters or receivers used by the licensees of the Federal Communications Commission in the Amateur Radio Service.
- Objective #7: The ARRL supports legislation authorizing FCC Commissioners to appoint an electrical engineer or scientist as an additional member of their staffs to ensure that Commissioners have adequate access to technical expertise when making decisions.

How did the ARRL become such an pivotal advocate for our hobby?

They have a long and distinguished history of doing just that for 105 years, beginning in 1914, just 2 years after amateur radio licensing began. In 1917, during World War I, the U.S. Navy took control of all radio use "for the duration of the war", as 6,000 radio amateurs were shut down and 4,000 of them enlisted in the U.S. military. In fact, legislation was introduced to give the Navy *permanent* control of all radio operations. The


ARRL launched its "Blue Card Campaign" in 1918, a public effort tirelessly pursuing legislators to get amateur radio back on the air and successfully did so by September of 1919. A fierce advocate organization was born and they've set a world standard ever since.

Pivotal in establishing amateur radio standards and practices of the new hobby, in 1926 ARRL published the first edition of *Amateur Radio Handbook*. An instant success, It became the world standard as a reference book from then on. Soon thereafter, ARRL held its first contest, called the 1928 International Relay Party and in 1933 held its first National Field Day. From 1935-1937 ARRL formed the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) and gained momentum as the authority for emergency communication protocols.

The ARRL continued to work closely with the newly-established FCC, assisting with technical expertise and supplies during World War II and developing new FCC rules called Basis and Purpose of Amateur Radio in the 1950s.

In 1984, the FCC delegated license testing to ARRL's Volunteer Examiner Coordinators and the ARRL's work on the

PRB-1 policy helped amateurs get zoning permission for antennas in 1985.

Over the years, governing authorities on the local, state and national level have come to recognize and respect ARRL's expertise in preparing amateur radio operators to provide emergency operations through several national emergencies such as the 9/11/2001 World Trade Center attack, Hurricane Katrina, Mudslides in the Pacific Northwest, Wildfires in California, and Hurricanes in Texas and Puerto Rico.

This gives ARRL established credibility as subject matter experts locally and nationally when advocating for policies that ensure that the future of the amateur radio is unencumbered and protected.

Though ARRL volunteers in Minnesota were successful in defending us as mobile amateur radio operators in the recent "Hands-free Bill", an April 1st ARRL email reports on important recent activity by ARRL members at the federal level, to ensure all states have federal protection from restricting mobile amateur radio operation. They said:

"Jerry Oxendine, K4KWh, of Gastonia, North Carolina wants the FCC to clarify that state and localities should have no authority to regulate Amateur Radio with respect to enacting "distracted driving" statutes. In his *Petition for Rule Making*, now designated as **RM-11833**, Oxendine contends that such statutes violate FCC rules on scope and operation of equipment by licensees; violate the intent of the FCC and Congress with respect to Amateur Radio's role in disasters, and hinders emergency operations using mobile equipment.

"There is *no* evidence that the operation of two-way radio has but an insignificant impact on 'distracted driving,'" Oxendine stated.

"Such distracted driving statutes usurp the authority of the FCC to regulate Amateur Radio, as well as Citizens Band and Part 90 Land Mobile Service users, Oxendine said in his *Petition*."

Here, here, Jerry. As fellow ham radio operators, you have our firm support of your rule making petition to the FCC and we anticipate your successful effort! We need to continue to "band together" for the sake of the hobby and that's why it is so important that we each join the ARRL. Those membership dues repay incalculable dividends in defense of amateur radio as we know it. Without perhaps even knowing it, we were a whisker away from losing our mobile operating rights in Minnesota, if not for the watchful eye of ARRL volunteers. ★
